Sacajawea in the Writings of Lewis and Clark

acagamea (also spelled Sacajamea, Sakakamea, etc.) was the Shoshone woman who traveled with the Lewis and Clark Espedition to explore the Louisiana Punchase from 1804 until 1806. She acted as a translator for the expedition, known as the Corps of Discovery. During the journey, both leaders, Merimeather Lewis and William Clark, kept journals. In 1814 they would co-ambor a book on the history of the expedition emisled *History of the Expedition worder the Command of Captaine Lewis and Clark*.





From Lewis's Journal

A ugust 17th Satturday 1805...Shortly after Cape. Clark arrived with the Interpreter Charbono, and the Indian wiman, who proved to be a sixter of the Chif Camealwair, the meeting of those people was really affecting, particularly between Sah cale-gar-we-ah and an Indian woman, who had been taken prisoner at the same time with her, and who had afterwards escaped from the Minnetures and rejoined her nation. At moon the Camoer arrived, and we had the satisfaction once more to find ourselves all together, with a flattering prospect of being able to obtain as many homes shortly as would enable us to prosicute our voyage by land should that by water be deemed unadvisable.

From History of the Expedition

We soon drew near to the camp, and just as we approached it a woman made her way through the crowd towards Sacajawea, and recognising each other, they embraced with the most tender affection. The meeting of these two young women had in it something peculiarly touching, not only in the adent manner in which their feelings were expressed, but from the real interest of their situation. They had been companions in childhood, in the war with the dimnetances they had both been taken prisoners in the same battle, they had shared and softened the rigours of their captivity, till one of them had escaped from the Minnetances, with scarce a hope of ever seeing her friend relieved from the hands of her enemies.
