

Diamante Poem: Antonyms

A diamante poem takes its name from the shape it make: a diamond. Diamante poems were introduced in 1969 by Iris Tiedt. There are two types of this poem: the synonym diamante uses two synonyms as the beginning and ending subject; the antonym diamante uses two antonyms as the beginning and ending subject.

This type of poem has specific structure. It is seven lines long. Each line has specific types of words.

- Line 1: one noun - the beginning subject of the poem
- Line 2: two adjectives that describe the subject in line 1
- Line 3: three -ing verbs related to the subject in line 1
- Line 4: four nouns; two about the subject in line 1, two about the one in line 7
- Line 5: three -ing verbs related to the subject in line 7
- Line 6: two adjectives that describe the subject in line 7
- Line 7: one noun - the ending subject of the poem

Example:

Happiness
Jolly, cheery
Laughing, loving, singing
Joy, delight, sorrow, misery
Crying, grieving, weeping
Gloomy, blue
Sadness

In the example, happiness and sadness are antonyms.
